Making Youth Ministry Activities Safe and Successful

Youth ministry activities can be faith-forming and community-building... as well as a lot of fun! We applaud youth ministry leaders for always seeking new ways to engage more students and creating meaningful opportunities for young people to serve. It is important to remember, however, that being in new and different environments can often expose us to new and different risks.



There are many steps that (Arch)Dioceses can take to ensure that thriving and service-oriented youth ministry programs remain an asset, not a liability. For example, employees and volunteers should be advised that any and all youth activities must be pre-approved by the (Arch)Diocese and by parents, and that written parental permission should be obtained for all youth activities that take place off-grounds. Did you know that March is National Ladder Safety Month? Each year, more than 100 people in the U.S. die of ladder-related accidents and many more are injured. But most ladder accidents are preventable by practicing smart ladder safety, which includes: choosing a ladder that's in good working condition, choosing the right ladder for the job, matching task to talent and age appropriateness, and positioning the ladder and the body safely at all times.
